Free expert talk

You are entitled to book a **free talk** each year on a subject from the updated list enclosed. Once you have booked a talk it is important to check that the details are correct. Our events diary, 'what's on', can be found on our website www.thegardensgroup.co.uk This allows you to easily verify that we have the correct time and date for any talks and shopping events you have arranged with us. The inclusion of your event on our online diary confirms your booking. Please be certain to check this entry to ensure we have the correct details for you.

Speaker availability is limited during the first three weeks of October (while we create our famous Christmas Displays).

Changes occasionally have to be made to booked talks should a specialist speaker become unavailable. Notice will be given where possible and a choice of alternative subjects offered.

Discount shopping visits to our centres

The majority of our talks use live plants and materials to demonstrate rather than slides. We prefer to speak for approximately 45 – 60 minutes and are delighted to field questions afterwards. We have a team of speakers and we share the bookings out with the most appropriate person available on a monthly basis. If you wish to book a specific speaker, please specify this when booking and we will endeavour to meet with these wishes although sometimes this may not be possible. Most talks can be booked for any time of the year.

(P) indicates that this subject may require you to provide a projector screen. The speaker will bring everything else including a projector.

Subjects marked * are specific to only one of our team of speakers. When booked a long time in advance there is occasionally a change of circumstances for the speaker, and we may need to invite you to select a different topic. Should this happen, we will gladly rebook the original subject for another day.

Garden Style

Trends and styles in gardening are evolving all the time so these talks are based on some of the more innovative trends using new techniques and new plants, without ignoring the best practice of the past and the best plants.

Container gardening

How and what to grow in containers including advice on pot choice, compost and many ideas on the plants that can be used and how to look after them.

Garden design

A look at the principles of garden design and practical tips on how to set about designing your own garden.

Gardening in climate change

With the changing weather conditions different ideas about what plants to grow and how best to look after the ones you have. This talk contains tips on how to get your garden in a robust state in order to cope with the challenges that climate change will pose. The talk discusses the challenges of gardening in a changing climate as well as soils, plant choice, watering, feeding, lawns, pests and how gardening can help in the battle.

Gardening for wildlife

A look into the reasons why one may wish to garden for wildlife and how to fit wildlife gardening into a conventional garden.

Growing your own

Topical tips on growing your own vegetables, maximising space and different planting combinations to try.

My seasonal shopping basket

A look at what great plants and products are available for the garden, a reminder of the seasonal chores and kit we may need to tackle them, plus plenty of discussion about plants that inspire us and deserve a place in our shopping basket.

Plants we love to hate* (P)

Some plants provoke an instant reaction when spotted. Neighbours go to war over horticultural incursions under (or over) the fence. Steve takes the time to look at a few of the 'trigger plants' from bindweed to leylandii.

Primitive plants* (P)

Steve investigates some of the first plants to develop characteristic features, including leaves, spines and flowers. Possible detours include the first vegetables and the first carnivorous plants...

Slightly naughty plants* (P)

Steve takes a fun look at plants that cheat, steal and deceive, followed by poisons, aphrodisiacs, perception altering and other uses the doctor wouldn't recommend.

Weeds* (P)

Some weeds are good news - they may be tasty, medicinal or great for particular kinds of wildlife. Other weeds are toxic, invasive and can have negative impact on wildlife. Yet more weeds are very pretty and have produced cultivated 'cousins' that flourish in our garden borders. With this talk we look at a few highs and lows in the world of weeds and consider some of the latest weed control strategies.

Sweet plants and sugar sources* (P)

Plants produce sugars. Some plants are famously sweet. With this talk we explore some of the traditional sugar/sweetener sources and how they can be grown and used in our gardens today.

The garden centre year*

A behind the scenes view of Castle, Brimsmore or Poundbury Gardens with an insight into the garden centre industry.

The lighter side of plants*

A light-hearted look at the side of plants that you do not usually see.

The story so far*
